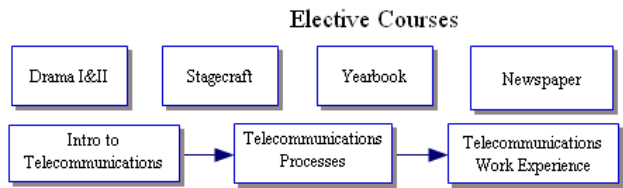
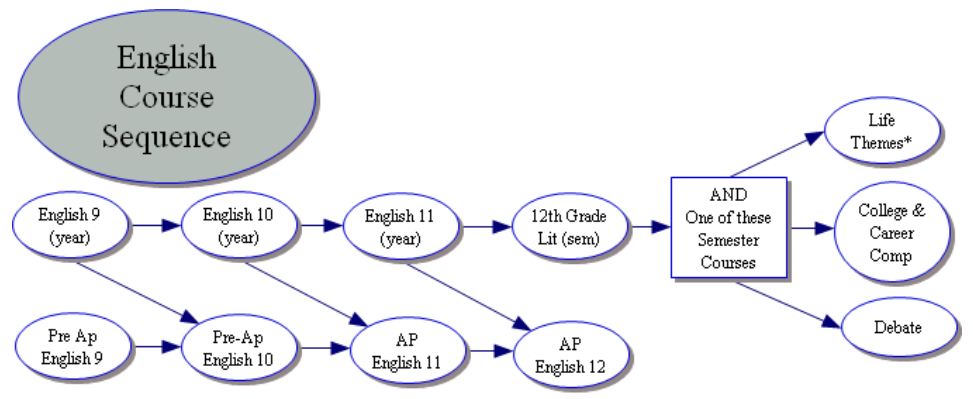
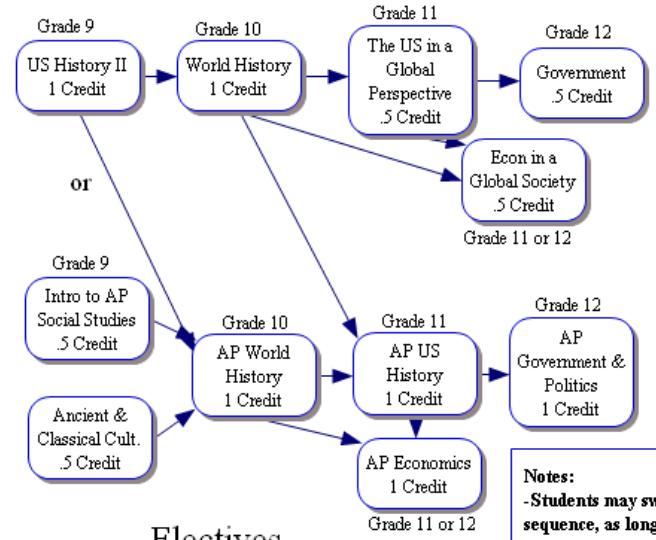

Social Studies Course Sequence

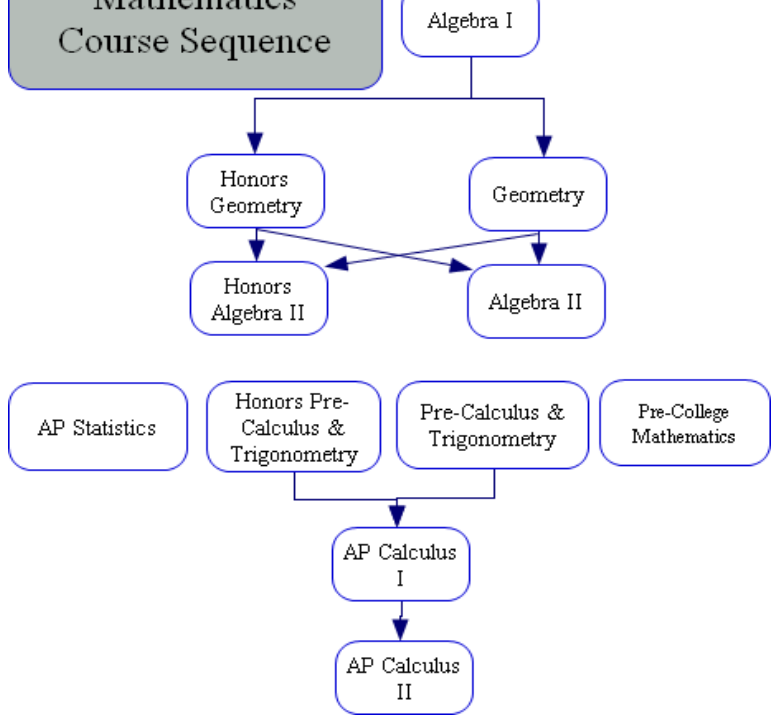

High School Transcribed Credit Allows Students to Earn College Credits in High School

The School District of Waukesha offers students selected “transcribed credit” classes which give students the ability to earn a grade from their high school and a grade from WCTC. This gives them a head start on college by attending WCTC or transferring those credits to another institution of higher learning. Waukesha offers 19 classes that allow the student to earn three or four college credits per class. In 2008-09 there were more than 750 enrollments in transcribed credit classes from students in the district.

The high school courses follow WCTC’s curriculum and use WCTC’s textbooks, tests, and resources. Students in a transcribed course do not need to take a comprehensive final exam to earn the credit, nor do they have to pay extra testing fees. They take the WCTC-written tests as part of the high school course. WCTC instructors work closely with the high school instructors to ensure the coursework that is being taught in the classes reflects the rigor and content of college coursework.

“Transcribed credit classes are a great opportunity for high school students because it allows them to earn college credit without incurring any extra expense or leaving their high school classroom,” explained WCTC School-to-Work Coordinator Susan Maresh.

When high school students successfully complete a transcribed credit class and fill out the proper enrollment forms, the class and credit will be displayed on an official WCTC transcript. Those credits can be used toward specific programs at WCTC or transferred to many four-year universities who will accept them as transfer credits.
